

















### SENIORS COMPETE IN BPA COMPETITION

On March 7 through 9, two Vassar High School seniors competed and advanced in the State competition of the Business Professionals of America organization. The competition was held in the Renaissance Center of Detroit. Mike Krause and Erik Zempel competed in the C++ Programming Competition. They then advanced to state after placing first and second (respectively) in the regional competition.

The C++ Programming competition consists of two parts: a written and application section. The written part is a multiple choice test on computers and programming in general, while the application part requires a realworld use of the C++ programming language. Mike Krause finished in this with an impressive third place, and he also qualified for the National competition held in Orlando, Florida on April 25-29.

"The application part was easy; it was the test that hurt me," commented Krause. The test pulls questions from the entire scope of computing. Anything from networks to memory to the legality of copying software is covered. Erik Zempel, who also competed in C++ Programming, agreed. "I think the test throws off a lot of people. Even with a solid knowledge of C++, many of the questions on the test were very difficult."







### SINKO WINS SCHOLARSHIP TO GEORGE WASHINGTON UNIVERSITY











### VHS SQUAD HAS SUCCESSFUL SEASON



#### A GLIMPSE AHEAD










## CHOIR




#### SOCIAL STUDIES TEAM TAKES FIRST






